Priority: Safer and Stronger Ashfield District Council is striving to create a safer District, where residents, visitors, and businesses feel secure.



We are here to listen

Our Community Protection Officers have been out and about to hear your concerns.

During our pop-up days of action in Hucknall and Selston, homelessness, drugs, shop theft, street drinkers and vehicle-related nuisance behaviour were all raised as concerns.

These events are an opportunity for us to engage with shoppers and businesses and gather intelligence. Following the event, we passed on intelligence to the relevant services.

We will be holding more pop-up events throughout the year so keep an eye on our social media to find out where we will be next.

FLY-TIPPER PAYS THE PRICE

A Sutton resident ended up with a hefty fine after bags of putrid rubbish were found abandoned on a public footpath.

Our CPO spotted the bags while out on patrol in Walton Street, Sutton. They mainly contained food wrappers, dirty nappies and empty beer cans.

They were linked back to a resident, where more of the same rubbish was found at the property, and they ended up in court. After pleading guilty, the resident was ordered to pay a fine of £466, victim surcharge of £186, court costs of £85, which totals to £737.

Community safety vans are real lifesavers

Our community safety vehicles are now equipped with defibrillators thanks to a generous donation from Lindum Group. The medical devices are used to deliver an electric shock to the heart in cardiac emergencies.

They have been fitted in three of our vehicles, meaning our teams will be able to provide immediate help in emergencies.

These improvements to our vans are part of our initiative to enhance safety and address anti-social behaviour in the District.



WARNING TO YOUNG PEOPLE INVOLVED IN ASB

Young people across Ashfield involved in environmental crime or anti-social behaviour will be held to account.

Following the introduction of the Immediate Justice Scheme in January this year, a new youth programme is being launched by the Police and Crime Commissioner. It will see young people involved in the crimes made to **repair the harm they have done to communities.**

The programme will include a community-focused element as well as an educational component. This approach aims to help young people aged 12 to 17 reflect on their experiences, guide them towards better decision making and provide preventative intervention.

To infinity and beyond

The brand-new Sherwood Observatory Planetarium and Science Discovery Centre has welcomed its first visitors.

The visitor attraction promises to welcome people from far and wide to the District to experience the new wrap-around immersive shows. It is an educational experience like no other as schools, scouts, guides and other groups are already booked in. The former Victorian subterranean reservoir has been transformed into an education centre below the planetarium and there is a café run by staff and students from the nearby ATTFE College.

The ambitious £6.8m project was led by the team at Sherwood Observatory and was made possible through several government funding rounds, corporate donations and the support of the Council.

WORKS UNDERWAY AT CORNERSTONE THEATRE

Refurbishment work has now started at Sutton Community Academy's theatre.

We are giving the building a new lease of life as it is upgraded and rebranded as Cornerstone Theatre.

The new theatre, which is due to be completed later this year, will offer shows, cinema, music and comedy nights.

It will feature new dressing rooms and a green room, toilets - including a changing places room - foyer and box office. The auditorium will be completely refurbished with new flooring, ceiling, acoustic wall treatments and doors.

PORTLAND SQUARE TRANSFORMATION STARTS

The transformation of Portland Square is well underway.

The new-look Portland Square will feature two raised lawns with inbuilt seating and 8 new semi-mature trees to bring greenery back into the centre. Alongside the planters will be new streetlighting, new level paving and more outdoor space for businesses to use. State-of-the-art CCTV cameras will also be fitted. Work is expected to be completed by the Summer. Together with the Cornerstone Theatre development and improvements to Low Street the new look square is part of a programme to transform Sutton into a vibrant and thriving town centre to be proud of.

PUTTING ASHFIELD ON THE MAP

Work is progressing on our flagship project that will see Ashfield become a trailblazer in the East Midlands for automation and distribution.

The development of the Automated Distribution and Manufacturing Centre (ADMC), is moving ahead at pace. This will be a national centre of excellence in automation, a home to innovation in technology and high skilled jobs.

The centre off Lowmoor Road, Kirkby, will be the centrepiece of a £100 million business park. This will attract investment from manufacturing and distribution companies, bringing new, well-paid jobs to the District. We are working in partnership with Vision West Nottinghamshire College (VWNC) and Nottingham Trent University (NTU) and other partners, including local businesses to deliver the ADMC.

The site received planning permission in Summer 2024 and preparatory works on site have started. The construction will take place throughout 2025. As part of the development of the business park, native trees and hedging will be planted to create wildlife habitats and to enhance the natural environment.

A new species-rich meadow and a wet grassland meadow will be created to further increase the biodiversity. The ADMC is scheduled to open in early 2026.

Mum of Ashfield soldier visits new homes

The mum of Adrian Sheldon has visited the site of new Council homes being named in his honour.

Diane Sheldon visited the site in Central Avenue, Kirkby, which will be **named** Adrian Sheldon View in honour of the rifleman who was killed in action in Afghanistan in 2009.

The site will feature 16 new homes and work is now being carried out on installing the drainage. It will include two and three-bedroom houses, with the work likely to be completed by Autumn 2026.

The new street has been completely cleared of vegetation and the derelict garages have been demolished ahead of the building work starting. The homes are being built on land just off Kingsway that has been sat derelict for many years after previously being used for Council garages.

The brownfields site will help us achieve our long-term goal of continuing to build more affordable housing.

These new homes will have increased insulation in the walls and floor, a gas boiler that is hydrogen ready, solar panels that will supply approximately 30% of electric use and electric vehicle charging ports.

We are desperately in need of good quality family homes in Ashfield as 4000 people are currently on our waiting list. This is why we will continue to find suitable locations to build Council homes across the District.

WORK STARTS ON TWO NEW HOUSING PROJECTS

Work has now started to create new Council homes in Brierly Road, Sutton, and Mill Close, Huthwaite.

Brierly Road will be home to **two two-bedroom bungalows** that will be suitable for wheelchair users. This is a group of housing applicants that we have struggled to assist in the past because of the limitations of our housing stock.

Mill Close will welcome **two three-bedroom houses.** The new homes will be thermally efficient with solar panels and other measures to reduce carbon use and make them more affordable to run.

Both developments are due to be completed by Spring 2025.



HARDWICK LANE WORK STARTS

Those in Sutton may have noticed work in Hardwick Lane as we start on our largest housing development to date.

We are building 40 new affordable homes which will be ideal for individuals, couples and families.

The site will feature two-bedroom bungalows, one and two-bedroom flats, two, three and four-bedroom houses. Two of the homes will have a **fourth bedroom and bathroom on the ground floor,** making them suitable for families where one member is a wheelchair user.

These new homes will have increased insulation in the walls and floor, a gas boiler that is hydrogen ready, solar panels that will supply approximately 30% of electric use and electric vehicle charging ports.

Back of the net for football plan

We have now approved plans to bring the Playzone programme to five sites in Ashfield. We are working with the Football Foundation on the investment programme which **creates new or refurbished mini all-weather pitches for football and other sports, such as basketball.**

The chosen locations are:

- Cowpasture Rec, Leamington
- Morven Park, Kirkby
- Selston High School
- Stamper Rec, Skegby
- Titchfield Park, Hucknall

We are now working to complete desktop surveys and site surveys will take place this month. We are keen to hear from any clubs/groups who would like to use the facilities. Please get in touch via healthandwellbeing@ashfield.gov.uk.

We are aiming to submit planning applications in late March and, if approved, for the build phase to take place late summer, with facilities open in Autumn 2025.

This is the first phase of a comprehensive package of works to **improve off-road cycling and walking routes.**

The half mile cycling and walking route between Southwell Lane and Penny

Emma Way has been widened to 1.8m width.

Works also included vegetation clearance, new wayfinding signage and resurfacing using recycled materials.

OLD SHOP GETS NEW PURPOSE

An empty high street shop has been brought back to life.

The property at 9-11 Low Street, Sutton has been designed to meet the demand for commercial, services industry and education providers looking for high quality, energy efficient space on the high street.

This is part of the Council's strategy to support our high streets to provide a wider variety of services to complement retail. No. 14 Low Street was also refurbished earlier in the year and now hosts the Rendezvous Café and two flats on the first floor.



The improvements have been designed to be sustainable and a recent appraisal showed that the property has met Net Zero requirements.
