Parks Places UPDATE

SELSTON COUNTRY PARK

Following community engagement and feedback in December and January, the plans for the new play facilities at Selston Country Park have been finalised.

The new play area will focus on the natural

environment by making the most of the landscape of the park to create an inclusive play environment. The play area will focus on using timber and rock, and enhancing existing features for sand play at the site to provide a new play experience in the heart of Selston.

The new play facilities will sit alongside the recently-opened Selston Café in the Park. The transformation of Selston Country Park forms part of the Council's strategy to improve play provision for the residents of Selston which was initially developed in 2018 to support the Parish Council to address the ageing play areas nearby.

Procurement of the new equipment is now underway ready for the new facilities to be ready in spring 2023.

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New Council Homes

Froghopper Lane

The new development in Sutton on Froghopper Lane, off Davies Avenue, now has happy tenants occupying the 22 contemporary family homes.

Froghopper Lane is made up of a mixture of houses, apartments and disabled adapted bungalows, with each home having allocated parking. The homes are energy efficient and built to be future-proof to ensure tenants enjoy warmer homes with lower bills.

15 Homes have been built in Hucknall on former garage



sites on Barbara Square, Chestnut Grove, Hawthorne Avenue, and Chatsworth Drive; and Sutton – 5 on Stoney Street, 2 bungalows on The Poplars, and 2 bungalows on The Beeches.

The Council are also currently building 62 homes across four sites in Sutton and Kirkby; 34 homes on Warwick Close, and 8 new homes on former garage sites on Darley Avenue and Spruce Grove, Kirkby, and 20 homes on Charlotte Gardens in Sutton.



Warwick Close

Work has started on Ashfield District Council's largest housing development to date on Warwick Close in Kirkby, which will see 34 new affordable family homes being built.

In total 18 two-bedroom and 16 threebedroom family homes will be built, with work scheduled to be completed by the winter of 2023. Located on the Coxmoor Estate, the new homes will include several energy efficiency measures to help towards the Council's carbon neutral aims.

BALLEYWAYS Following a public consultation throughout December, CLOSED

Following a public consultation throughout becomes, eight alleyways notorious for attracting anti-social behaviour in Sutton, Kirkby, and Hucknall, will be closed or restricted under a new Public Spaces Protection Order (PSPO).

The proposed PSPO will allow gates to be installed

blocking access to the following locations:

In Kirkby:

- Between Spruce Grove and Beacon Drive
- Adjacent 40 Rosewood Drive
- Between Spruce Grove and Poplar Avenue

In Sutton:

- Between Bentinck Street and Bramley Court
- Between Downing Street and North Street
- Between Welbeck Street and Portland Close
- Between Bramley Court and Sutton Lawn

In Hucknall:

• Rear of 34-37 Rockwood Walk

The Council's Community Safety Team have been working to identify alleyways that have been hot spots for crime and anti-social behaviour. The alleyways will be closed in the spring and shows the Council's commitment to working with residents to find solutions to the problems they face.

Closing the alleyways is part of the Council's Safer Streets initiatives, which has led to extra CCTV, improved street lighting and world-first Refuge camera technology in Sutton, which will soon be rolled out in Kirkby. The Council is determined to do all it can to assist Nottinghamshire Police in making Ashfield a safer place to live.

We are rolling out The BIG Ashfield Spring Clean across the District for the sixth year as part of the Council's commitment to make Ashfield a cleaner place to live, work, and visit. We recognise that this year the last thing you want to pay for is a skip, or a man with a van, and during the current climate, The BIG Ashfield Spring Clean is just another way that Ashfield District Council is helping residents.

Residents are invited to get rid of an extra bag of household waste during their designated week.

On top of this Flying Skips will be out and about across the District for you to dispose of extra waste, bulky items, toys, and furniture.

We'll be inviting local schools and volunteers to get involved in litter picks in their communities, as well as donating planters, seeds, and soil to schools to encourage them to grow their own flowers and vegetables.

We will also be continuing with our year-long rolling free bulky waste collections which allow residents the chance to dispose of up to three items for free.

FREC BULKY WASTE COLLECTIONS

The way we offer free bulky waste collections has changed. Every household can now book ONE free collection of up to three items each calendar year from 1 April to 31 March. Residents can book a free collection based on where they live.

The new year of collections starts in April with Kirkby & the Rurals, moving to Hucknall in May, and Sutton in June. The rotation then starts again, giving every resident the chance to book their one collection at four points throughout the year. The collections are available when it suits residents.

Cost of Living help

Over the next few pages we'll walk you through the support the Council, and other organisations, can offer to help you and your family navigate the difficulties that may arise due to the cost of living.

Getting financial help to keep warm

Rising energy bills mean keeping your home warm can be a struggle. There is financial support in place to help you when it's cold.

Winter fuel payment

This is an annual payment for older people.

To qualify you must receive a state pension (some exclusions apply) or get another social security benefit (not Housing Benefit, Council Tax Reduction, Child Benefit or Universal Credit).

If you qualify but haven't received an automatic payment contact the winter fuel payment helpline: telephone: 0800 731 01 60.

Warm Home Discount

The Warm Home Discount (WHD) is a oneoff discount on your energy bill over the winter. This year the discount is £140. It is available for 2 groups of people:

- Core group: you receive the Guarantee Credit element of Pension Credit
- Broader group: you have a low income and meet your energy supplier's individual criteria.

Cold weather payment

The cold weather payment is distributed if the average temperature in the area is recorded as, or forecast to be, 0 degrees Celsius or below for 7 consecutive days.

You may be eligible to receive a cold weather payment if you receive an eligible means-tested benefit;

- Pension Credit
- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Universal Credit

• Support for Mortgage Interest

You'll receive £25 for each 7 day period of very cold weather between 1 November and 31 March.

Warm Rooms



A series of warm rooms have been set up across the District to provide safe spaces for people to enjoy warmth and company.

Ashfield District Council and Everyone Active have partnered to provide a warm room, every week, in Kirkby Leisure Centre, Hucknall Leisure Centre, and Lammas Leisure Centre. Residents can enjoy a free hot drink and biscuits, take part in an activity, or just have a conversation in a nice warm environment. Residents can take advantage of the warm rooms in our leisure centres on the following days until the end of February, places don't need to be booked:



- Mondays at Kirkby Leisure Centre from 10.30am-12pm
- Tuesdays at Hucknall Leisure Centre from 1.30pm-3pm
- Wednesdays at Lammas Leisure Centre from 1.30pm-3pm

FEEDING ASHFELD

Ashfield District Council launched the Feeding Ashfield Network last year to bring together resources and organisations who can help to end food insecurity, and provide a lifeline to many residents during this difficult time.

The network is live on our website and features information on food banks and food clubs, where to find them, and how to access them.

Food banks – Often work on referrals and provide food, free of charge, to residents who need it.

Food clubs – Provide high quality food for a small fee, usually £15 worth of food for ± 3.50 , and are open to everyone (some require you to live or work within 15 minutes)

How the Council can help you

Ashfield District Council is committed to supporting residents through the issues arising due to the cost of living. As part of our commitment we have created a plan that outlines ways we can help residents. On these pages you will find some of the points from the plan.



Charging Zone

We have opened a new charging zone in our reception area at our Kirkby offices, to allow anyone to come in and charge up their electronic devices; saving residents money on their utility bills. We also offer free Wi-Fi and computer access to those who need it.



Support and Benefits

We will work with partners such as the DWP on holding Cost of Living Zones to ensure residents can access all the support and benefits to which they are entitled.

Two hours free parking

Ashfield District Council is continuing to provide two hours free parking in all Council-owned car parks in Ashfield to encourage shopping local to support our independent businesses. The two

hours free parking will allow more residents to access our town centres without spending out on parking, or excess fuel to visit out of town retail parks.

Play Park Strategy

Continue to invest tens of thousands of pounds into the District's parks to create free, stateof- the-art play areas, and green spaces for families across Ashfield. Giving residents the chance to experience and interact with nature, and sports to improve well being.

Secure Funding

The Council continues to support the voluntary sector to secure any available funding which may be able to help residents with the cost of living.



Council Tax Support Scheme

We provide a Council Tax Support Scheme for eligible residents who are on a low income and are struggling to pay their Council tax. We will maintain a 100% Council Tax Support Scheme for residents up to March 2024 as part of our plan.

Council Tax Support is usually given if you receive Income Support, Job Seeker's Allowance, Employment Support Allowance, Pension Credit, or Universal Credit.

Even if you do not receive any of those benefits you may still be eligible if you are on a low income.

These agencies provide essential lifelines throughout our community and we are proud to work with them during the cost of living.

Getting help with your money

Everyone is feeling the pressure of rising bills and the cost of living at the moment - but there's help at hand if you are worried about money.

Don't Take the Bait

The England Illegal Money Lending Team (IMLT) have released figures that show that more than half the victims they have supported in the first half of 2022 had turned to illegal money lenders, or loans sharks, to pay for essentials such as utilities, food, and fuel. It is estimated that 1.08 million people could already be in debt to an illegal money lender.

Loan sharks are capitalising on the current financial climate to prey on vulnerable people who need money fast. If you are thinking of borrowing money always check that the firm or person is listed on the Financial Services Register, make sure they have permissions for the regulated activities you need, and only use the contact details

Debt and borrowing advice

We understand residents may be worrying about their borrowing that was previously affordable but now making payments may be a struggle. It is important to seek advice as early as possible as finding a solution is much easier in the early stages.

We are working with Stop Loan Sharks to run a campaign raising awareness of the dangers of loan sharks. We jointly ran a competition with Quarrydale School to design artwork which will be featured on the sides of our bin lorries, so keep an eye out for the winning design!

Struggling to afford your rent or mortgage payments?

Rent and mortgage payments are important and it's good to know where you can go for help when you need it.

If you rent and have a change in circumstance that means you may be struggling with payments, you can apply to the Council for a Discretionary Housing Payment.

These are not guaranteed and are paid for a period of six months, but if you are eligible, they can help you make your rent payments whilst you improve your circumstances or look for cheaper accommodation. Please contact our Housing Options team on 01623 450000 for advice.

If you are struggling with your mortgage repayments, speak to your bank or building society for help – or speak to Step Change for advice around arrears.

£4m grant boost to keep Ashfield homes warm

Ashfield District Council has invested over £4million to improve the energy efficiency rating of 200 Council and private sector homes within the District.

The funding has been provided as part of the Government's Green Homes Grant Local Authority Delivery scheme and Social Housing Decarbonisation schemes. The funding has allowed the Council to improve the thermal efficiency and/or reduce grid energy demand in Council and private sector homes in Ashfield.

One of the projects funded by the Green Home Grant was the installation of solar panels to the roofs of 81 Council homes and 34 private homes in the District.

This included bungalows on Carrfield Close, Sutton in Ashfield; Columbia Street, Huthwaite; and Lancaster Road (Astral Grove) Hucknall amongst other locations.

These solar panels provide tenants' homes with an amount of free generated energy for use at the time of generation, meaning lower bills for the tenants at a time when energy costs are rising. Cllr John Smallridge outside the bungalows on Carrfield Close that benefited from the scheme

For a typical Council-owned bungalow, the panels generate on average 84kWh of energy per square metre (of panel) per year per home, saving on average 5.3 tonnes of Carbon per year per home helping the Council meet its Net Zero Carbon targets.

The Green Home Grant Phase Ib also funded external wall insulation to 31 Council homes and 14 privately owned lower income households.

The Social Housing Decarbonisation Scheme Wave I funded upgrades to 104 council homes, which included external wall insulation and associated works to eligible properties (social properties).

The Council has also submitted a further bid to the Social Housing Decarbonisation Scheme for a second wave of upgrades to a further 87 council homes in Ashfield.

The cost-of-living crisis is a worrying time for everyone. Survivors of domestic abuse are being faced with a terrible choice; remaining in an unsafe home, or facing financial destitution or homelessness.

The threat of financial destitution or homelessness has long been known to be barriers to leaving an abusive relationship. The cost-of-living crisis is only exacerbating this issue. No one should have to stay with an abusive partner simply because they have nowhere else to go.

Domestic abuse isn't always physical. Perpetrators of domestic abuse are using concerns of financial hardship during the cost-of-living crisis as an extra tool for coercive control. This can include restricting access to money, work, or items people need such as clothing and food.

If you, or someone you know, is facing this situation you are not alone and there is help available.

COMING SOON... Hucknall's £2.7m Teaching Pool

Ashfield District Council's new teaching pool at Hucknall Leisure Centre will soon be ready to welcome a new generation of swimmers!

Work on the brand-new second swimming pool is progressing well, and the facility is on track to open in early summer 2023. Concrete foundations have been laid and the external structure of the new building, which will house the pool, has been connected to the existing structure.

The new teaching pool, with a maximum depth of 900mm, will focus on providing swimming lessons to the Hucknall community.

This work will complete the £5.5million investment into Hucknall Leisure Centre which has included upgrading the gym with stateof-the-art equipment, a brand-new café and reception area, a new wetside changing village featuring different sized areas to accommodate multiple users, and new cycling studios.
